THE PRESENTATION

INSTRUCTIONAL LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE

This introductory panel presentation will introduce the audience to issues of concern for LBGTQ parents. Psychoanalytic understandings of the dynamics of those issues will be covered. The panel will also introduce the audience to a community intervention designed to meet the needs of this underserved population. The concerns of LGBTQ parents for their children are complex and myriad. A 3-year old child of a male couple calls one of them mommy. They worry about what this means and what to do. A 13 year old hides that his parents are gay. There are limitless such situations. The dynamics underlying both children's behaviors and parents' concerns have implications that range from play dates to the consulting room to developmental theory. The papers in this panel will address different aspects of these issues through describing our presentations to groups of LGBTQ parents and considering the unconscious dynamics that may be at play. Frontiers of identity category, adoption, insemination, multiracial families, and their intersections, will be forged. We will flex the border between panel and audience by emphasizing attendees' engagement in both questions and knowledge-sharing in a mutual learning process about the complex and rich frontiers these families' experiences illuminate.

Attendees are encouraged to come prepared for the Q&A portion of this program with examples from their clinical practice or personal lives.

THE PRESENTERS

Sheri Ashcraft, Psy.D. - a psychoanalyst and clinical psychologist in private practice in Coral Gables, Fl. She primarily works with adults and couples across the lifespan. She is currently on the faculty of the Florida Psychoanalytic Institute where she teaches candidates and students in the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program. Prior to engaging in a full time private practice, she was on staff at the Miami VAMC and specialized in the treatment of trauma related disorders with veterans who experienced combat and sexual trauma in the military.

Lynne Harkless, Ph.D. — a psychologist and psychoanalyst in full time private practice in Miami, Florida. She is a Faculty member of the Florida Psychoanalytic Institute and Director of the Institute's Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program. She is a recipient of the American Psychoanalytic Association's Edith Sabshin Teaching Award. She has published and presented in national conferences on various topics related to gender and sexuality over the past 10 years. Recently she has been involved in large panel presentations and small focus group engaging the concerns of LGBTQ parents in the South Florida area.

Jill Hartog, LCSW - a clinical social worker who was in private practice in Miami, Florida for 30 years. In her private practice Ms. Hartog treats adolescents and adults in individual, couple, family and group psychotherapy. Ms. Hartog was a staff member in the George Washington University Medical Center Department of Psychiatry. She is a Faculty member and Supervisor in the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program at the Florida Psychoanalytic Society. She has been a member of a community panel for LGBTQ.

Shelley Payne, Ph.D. — a clinical psychologist in private practice in Coral Gables , FL. where she treats children, adolescents and adults in individual, couples and family therapy. She is currently a member of Southeast Florida Association for Psychoanalytic Psychology, Division 39 of the American Psychological Association, International Association of Relational Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy, and the Florida Psychoanalytic Society, of which she is a board member. Dr. Payne has taught classes in the Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Course of the Florida Psychoanalytic Society. She has been a panel member of a community project addressing concerns of LGBTQ parents in S. Florida for the past 3 years.
